CLARK AND WADDELL NAMED SCHOLARS

Recognizing senior National Merit Semifinalists

Two of Marist's own, seniors Nick Clark and Iain Waddell were among the approximately 16,000 students chosen as Semifinalists in the 64th annual National Merit Scholarship Program representing the top 1% of 1.6 million students who took the PSAT in the fall of 2017.

15,000 of these Semifinalists are expected to move on to become a Finalist and be eligible to win a National Merit Scholarship.

Clark and Waddell will be notified this February if they have been selected as a Finalist based on their SAT score, overall academic record, scholarship appli-

cation, high school endorsement, and an essay.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation also presented Marist seniors Brandon Foster, Lily Fraser, and Tess Louie with Letters of Commendation for being in the top 3.3% of scores.

This 'academic competition' just began for the current junior class Wednesday, Oct. 10, as they took their PSAT test in the Marist Activity Center.
